Honoured, by a large array of distinguished guests and attendees, including professional colleagues, close family friends, associates, and well-wishers drawn from various occupational backgrounds, interests, and groups (the city of Ibadan-based and neighbouring universities, various research and training institutes including the Agricultural, major publishing houses, bookshops and libraries, women empowerment groups, social clubs, and religious institutions among them), present at the public presentation and launch of the new book on **WOMEN, AGRICULTURE, AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT: Perspectives from Nigeria**, published by CEGGAD, in conjunction with ABATOM Books (A Publication Arm of ABATOM Associates (2023)). Other highlights of the Event were as follows: Venue, Dr Olusegun Aganga Hall at the International Conference Centre (ICC), University of Ibadan, Oyo State, Nigeria; Date, Saturday September 2, 2023; Time, 11.00 am prompt. As the Guests were to be later informed in a Brief and Surprise Announcement made by the Author's Consort Emeritus Professor Adekanye towards the

end of Programme, however, the Date chosen for the Book Presentation and Launch, namely Saturday September 2, 2023, was also the Author-Celebrant's 81st Birthday Anniversary, thereby adding a little festive side to what most of the Guests present would have originally thought was going to be a largely academic affair albeit admixed with some marketing elements (i.e., salesmanship). Meanwhile, to help in directing the Programme of Event from the High Table, the organisers had succeeded in attracting and having seated, *a legal luminary and the matriarch of the bar*, Chief (Mrs.) Folake Solanke, SAN, OON, CON, as the Chairperson, Ably represented by the oldest child Dr. Yemisi Solanke-Koya, Esq., The Head of the Chambers/Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Alabukun Law Chambers; while, for *"the Mother of the Day"*, no better suited individual could have been found to serve in that capacity than the distinguished personality Mama Professor Bolanle Awe, CFR, *the retired Professor of Oral History and Traditions, University of Ibadan*, and *"the Matriarch of Feminist History in Nigeria"*. As most of the distinguished guests present were also to learn towards the end of the Programme, Mama Professor Awe (then Ms. Bolanle Fajembola) had been *a flower girl* at the Wedding of the Author-Celebrant's late parents going way back some 80 years before at Otapete Methodist Church in Ilesa, December 23, 1941; thereby adding to her qualifications for the role assigned her as *"The Mother of the Day"*. The Book Reviewer was Professor Taiwo Timothy, himself one of the former PhD supervisees of the Author's, and by then holding the position of Professor & Head of Department of Agricultural Economics, University of Ibadan. The latter's counterpart from the University of Ibadan's Department of Political Science, Professor Irene Aituaje Pogason, Professor & Head of that Department, who was also present, helped take up the task of Introduction of Author when the time came. The Focal Organisation for the Book Presentation and Launch event was the quasi-intergovernmental body the DAWN Commission, whose Director-General, Seye Oyeleye, Esq., along with most members of his top management team was also present, and so duly recognised by the Master of Ceremonies, and moved up from somewhere in the middle of the Hall where he was initially seated to the front rolls. The inimitable radio presenter and news caster, popularly referred to as *"the Music Man"*, Yanju Adegbite, was the Master of Ceremonies. The person who had been pencilled down to serve as *the Book's Chief Presenter and Chief Launcher* was from the organised private sector, but for confidential reason his name had to be kept unannounced to the public until the day of Event and at the Venue, although he had all along assured both the Author and her Husband about accepting the invitation and being in attendance. *An eminently qualified pharmacist and tailbrazer in local pharmaceutical manufacturing*, the person was Chief (Dr.) Theophilus Adebowale Omotosho (His Traditional titles are just too many to list but

include the “*High Chief Otun of Awe*”, “*Seriki B'asegun of Ibadan*”, “*Otunba Ba'mogun of Ibeiiin*”, “*Atobase of Ogbomosho Land*”), Chairman Chemical Industries Group of Companies, Chief Chief (Dr.) Omotosho was the Book's Chief Presenter and Chief Launcher, and ably represented at the Event by one of the CEOs from his Group of Companies. The Programme of Event had scarcely advanced much when another very important invitee, but also previously not publicly and announced, “*the Honourable Commissioner for Women's Affairs in the Oyo State Government, Hon. (Mrs.) Toyin Balogun*” arrived with a big delegation of officials from that State Ministry, including half-a-dozen of Women all wearing white aso oke-made frock dress with red gele head-gear to boot. After being graciously welcomed, the Honourable Commissioner Hon (Mrs.) Toyin Balogun apologised for being late to the Event, and said she had “*come both to represent the Oyo State Governnor His Excellency Engr. Seyi Makinde*” and also in “*her own official capacity as the head of one of the State Ministries directly implicated in the subject-matter of the book*” on **WOMEN, AGRICULTURE AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT** that was being publicly presented and launched that day. The Honourable Commisioner added that another Cabinet colleague of hers heading a State Ministry also directly implicated in the business of the day, namely the State Ministry of Agricukture, Natural Resources, and Rural Development, would have liked to be present but could not do so due to clash of official duties. A verbal note of "apologies for absence" from the Honourable Commissioner from that other State Ministry was formally conveyed by the Women's Affairs Commissioner Honourable (Mrs.) Balogun through the Event's Chairperson to the Author Professor Tomilayo Adekanye particularly. For it was remembered that the Author had once served as Commissioner in that same State Ministry more than thirty years before.

29. As if the large array and calibre of Distinguished Guests in attendance at the Event of September 2, 2023 just described was not an enough honour, there was also the observation about former students most of them by then promoted full Professors being in the contingent of professional colleagues, both male and female, that came from the Department of Agricultural Economics, University of Ibadan, to attend the Book Presentation and Launch. Among them were those former students whom the Author-

Celebrant had personally "scouted" for and helped to recruit and appoint into the Teaching Staff of the Department during her tenure as Professor & Head of Department of Agricultural Economics at Ibadan some thirty years ago (1994-1997, see above). To now see and hear a number of these former students (by then, almost all already promoted full Professors and/or Subject-Matter Experts in their various fields of specialisation within the Discipline), paying glowing tributes about their former teacher's personal qualities, academic accomplishments, and contributions to their own individual careers, was the highest of honours that those former students could have done to the former Teacher, long-turned "*Great-Grandmother Professor of Professors of Agricultural Economics*", and now the Author-Celebrant. All these were apart from the donations accompanying the Book Launch itself as well as its public placements, both the actual money and promissory notes received from many of the Guests for purchases of copies of book made on the floor of the Hall, gifts, as well as other non-monetary contributions from many others still especially in respect of the Author-Celebrant's Birthday Anniversary.
